That faith in God gives meaning and purpose to human life;

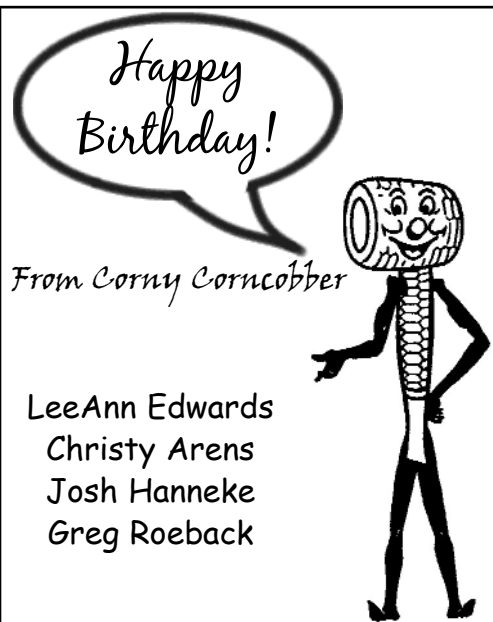
That the brotherhood of man transcends

What is JAYS?

The United States Junior Chamber believes in this statement: *Kids shouldn't smoke!* The problem is, despite the existence of state minimum-age laws, too many underage people buy cigarettes and smoke. The first phase of our initiative was the "We Card" program, where Jaycees enlisted convenience store clerks in signing a pledge that they would "card" questionable purchasers to determine their exact age, attacking underage smoking at the distribution level. The program was so successful it was taken over by the National Association of Convenience Stores after only two years.

Now, the U. S. Junior Chamber has enter Phase II of our youth smoking prevention message by getting directly into community schools and educating children at an early age with the JAYS Program.

What is the JAYS Nationwide Chapter Project?

Jaycees Against Youth Smoking (JAYS), is a free, educational program that goes directly into elementary and middle school classrooms to teach children about the dangers of smoking and to help them make the informed decision to be smoke free

Who developed and wrote the JAYS Curriculum?

The individuals who wrote JAYS are Magen Kelsay, former staff officer at the USJC National Service Center, and Dr. Jill Steeley, Assoc. Professor of Oral Roberts University. Dr. Steeley provided the educational guidelines to follow when creating curriculum and we also performed extensive research on previously published materials donated by several established national health organizations.

Who funds the JAYS Project?

The JAYS Program is funded with an unrestricted grant from RJ Reynolds Tobacco Corporation.

What is an unrestricted grant?

An unrestricted grant is a grant that gives the receiver of the grant the ability to have total control.

JAYCEE GLOSSARY

BLUE CHIP - A chapter management program designed to assist local chapters in developing the total Jaycee concept.

CPG - Chairman's Planning Guide. A series of 15 questions used to properly plan, execute and evaluate all Jaycee programs and projects.

DEGREES OF JAYCEES - A program designed to help individual members receive the benefits of their membership; a Junior Chamber career path outline. The program consists of three phases divided into 10 degrees.

INDIVIDUAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS - The self-improvement programs of a chapter, aimed at teaching, developing, and increasing the individual member's personal and leadership skills.

JAYCEE CREED - A statement of philosophy and beliefs adopted by The U.S. Junior Chamber and JCI. The Creed was written by the late C. William Brownfield of Columbus, Ohio, in 1946. Brownfield later served as national vice president.

JCI - Junior Chamber International. The worldwide Jaycees organization now operating in more than 100 countries.

M-NIGHT - Membership Night. A social gathering to allow prospective Jaycees to meet a chapter's members.

POC - Parade of Chapters - Competition among the chapters within the state in which points are earned and a ranking is established on a quarterly and annual basis.

JCI Senator - The highest honor bestowed by JCI on a current or past member for his or her contributions to the Jaycees. A senator is a life member of JCI.

WONDERLAND CAMP

Charles J. Miller had a dream. It all started the summer of 1969 during a conversation with the director of the Woodhaven Learning Center, a school for mentally and physically challenged children in Columbia, Missouri.

His dream was of a residential summer camp on property he and his brother-in-law, Harry Brown, owned, located on the Lake of the Ozarks. A camp where the physically and mentally challenged could experience the exhilaration of outdoor living and play. A camp designed to match their needs and provide them with the safety with freedom to enjoy nature.

Meetings and discussions with concerned groups led to a meeting with the Missouri Jaycee Executive Committee. Mr. Miller told the Jaycees of his dream, and on May 17, 1970, the Missouri Jaycees voted to adopt the camp project. Mr. Miller and Mr. Brown donated their land; 35 undeveloped acres adjoining the Lake of the Ozarks with an additional 100 acres for nature trails and out camping. They named it Wonderland Camp and it was incorporated as a not-for-profit foundation.



Jaycee chapters throughout the state came forward to contribute. The Kansas City Jaycees provided the professional architectural and planning services. The Southern Platte Chapter took on half the cost and labor involved in installation of a well and pump. And Jaycee Chapters throughout the state gave liberally of their labor to build the facilities.

Although only a few buildings were completed, the camp was functionally sound and usable enough to welcome its first campers in the spring of 1972. By the August closing date 157 children and 83 counselors and staff had used and thoroughly enjoyed the new Wonderland Camp. Since the first small start, construction has gone forward. Facilities have been expanded to provide an outdoor camping experience for approximately 1,000 campers in 2001. The camp is still growing.

The mission of Wonderland Camp is to provide a fun, educational camp experience for mentally and physically individuals, to offer a respite from daily care giving for family members and health care workers and to provide and nurture a personal development experience for volunteers and staff.

"Today, Wonderland Camp serves as an ever-green program for the Missouri Jaycees and the camp experience best exemplifies the final line of the Jaycee Creed, "Service to humanity is the best work of life."

One of the Ten Outstanding Young Men of the Nation!

The United States Junior Chamber of Commerce (the Jaycees) named Elvis One of the Ten Outstanding Young Men of the Nation for 1970 in a ceremony on January 16, 1971, one of Elvis' proudest moments. This award has been given since 1938 and has honored men of achievement in all areas of endeavor - sports, government, science, medicine, entertainment, etc. It recognizes outstanding personal achievement and the exemplification of the opportunities available in the free enterprise system, along with patriotism, humanitarianism, and community service. The award is on display at Graceland. (In the 1980's, eligibility was opened to women as well as men, and the award has since been presented to the year's Ten Outstanding Young Americans.)

New Dues Billing Procedure

We are trying to simplify your life! *Starting with your Jaycees dues.*

At the January membership meeting the board proposed that we pro-rate dues this year so that everyone can pay their dues for 2007 in January. With this new policy you won't have to try and remember your renewal month. Your Jaycee dues are \$48 per-year or \$4.00 per month. At the February membership this proposal was voted on and passed unanimously.

Example: Corny Corncobber's renewal month is May. When May of 2006 comes around Corny will only be billed for May through December.

8 months x \$4 = \$32. When January of 2007 comes around Corny will be billed for \$48 for a full year.

Volunteer at the FC Humane Society!

It can be as easy as unfolding newspapers in the shelter or at home and laying them flat so that we have fresh newspapers that line the cages for the puppies and smaller animals. (Throughout the day papers are pulled in layers to keep the cages fresh and the animals clean. If the staff has to stop and do this chore, it takes hours before they can even begin to clean cages.)
